



CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

The following code of conduct has been established to help students in the college to show courteous behaviour and social etiquette besides adhering to the norms and standards laid down from time to time.

- 1. Students are expected to evince a high sense of discipline and good behaviour worthy of a reputed co-educational institution during their period of study in the college.
- 2. All students shall adhere to the curricular framework adopted by the college as per NEP 2020 guidelines.
